

Achievements and Reflection on Major Concerns: Feedback and Follow-up

Major Concern 1: Pursuing Intellectual Excellence

Major Achievements

- The statistics of average "Assignment Submission Percentage" has continuously improved
 with some major improvements observed in senior forms. The number of students attaining
 "Perfect Assignment Record" (with all assignments submitted on time) has steadily
 increasing. This suggested that an encouraging population of students has developed and
 sustained desirable learning habits and attitude.
- The academic results of HKDSE 2024 and degree offer received in JUPAS 2024 have both been steadily improving with some new record high statistics again. There were students obtaining 5** in 3 core subjects, Visual Arts and Physical Education. The gradual and steady improvement in academic results has been encouraging and students' achievements in the three major pillars of the school academics, arts and sports, have been the most rewarding to the efforts of the school in insisting on its unique mission and provision of balanced education.
- Learning and study skills training workshops were organized for F.1 students during the Summer Bridging Course to help students adapt to the learning styles in secondary school; and the low achievers of junior forms during the Summer Academic Enhancement Programme to help them improve the learning skills and strategies. Feedback from students and parents was positive.
- All subjects completed the collaborative learning practice within their own subject. Some inter-subject collaborations (e.g. STEAM activities, PE and Hist., VA and Geog., Chi. Lit. & Chi. Hist. etc) were also conducted and sharing of good practice among subject panel heads and subject teachers were made convenient through network drive. Some collaborative learning activities were well received by students. However, the effects on student's learning has to be observed with more data collection in the future.
- An information literacy seminar was conducted for all senior form students. A former director of News and Public Affairs of Commercial Radio was invited to educate students about the importance of effective and ethical use of information online. More than 60% of the participants agreed that they were more able to assess the reliability of information on the internet. Students were equipped with basic skills to use and share the online information ethically. Awareness about respecting intellectual property has also been enhanced.
- Reading across curriculum approach was strengthened by implementing various theme-based activities. Ten sessions of teacher's book sharing on multiple non-textbook themes with some interactive activities, two Author's Talks, and a theme-based reading workshop regarding the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) were carried out. More than half of the students found these topics interesting and the sharing sessions enjoyable. However, the SDGs reading workshop was not as effective as expected. The connection between reading and the theme of the workshop was minimal and students showed limited interest on the game.

- The use of IT tools and conduction of e-learning activities were implemented in different subjects. However, many of those remains traditional and superficial, and the effectiveness in enhancing teaching and learning is yet to be observed. While it was observed that more students were getting used to learning with IT tools and devices both inside and outside classrooms, students' competent use of technologies to improve learning efficiency and capacity has to be monitored and improved with further efforts.
- The AI curriculum (with the adoption of teaching resources from CUHK) was implemented in junior forms to enhance students' readiness for future challenges. Positive feedback was received from students and teachers in the aspect of AI learning and teaching. The impacts of AI on teaching and learning were addressed through staff professional development. More teachers are making attempts to understand and explore more on the use of AI to support teaching. Occasional good practices of the use of AI in teaching were observed during lesson observation, and teachers need more time and training to accumulate experiences on this aspect.
- The promotion of STEAM has gradually gained more importance in school. The number of STEAM projects involving external resources has increased from 5 last year to 11 this year. An increasing population of junior form students (from around 5% last year to more than 13%) actively participated in territory-wide inter-school competitions related to STEAM. With the resources and support from "IT Innovation Lab" and more collaboration of subjects, STEAM education will take a more curriculum-approach for all students in junior forms in the future.
- Evaluation of the implementation of LAC in different subjects were conducted and trials were done in some subjects (e.g. IS and Maths in junior forms and CS in senior forms). Positive feedback was received from students and their performance in some language-laden questions was slightly improved. The arrangement of LAC lesson in F.1 English may not be the most effective and it was suggested that LAC elements and activities should be routinely incorporated into EMI subjects. Selected teachers (including English, Maths, Science and PSHE subjects) also enrolled in LAC training organized by HKU. A follow-up staff development workshop will also be provided in the next academic year. Non-English teachers need to be convinced of their important role in students' learning of the language (especially the specific language terms/structure used in particular subjects).
- A team of English teachers helped train students' speaking and presentation skills on different
 occasions throughout the year. Students' presentation skills in morning assemblies and
 sharing improved in terms of their pronunciation and communication strategies. However,
 some weaker students were not ready to present confidently due to the lack of practice as
 English teachers didn't have ample time to train them.

Reflection

- Despite the gradual resumption after the pandemic, there is still room for improvement in students' learning habits and attitude. This is particularly important for our students who have strong involvement and a packed schedule in PE/VA. They need more intensive coaching and guidance to evolve into self-directed learners.
- Lunch time detention class was arranged to allow students having after-school team training to catch up with assignments. However, some students still could not complete all the uncollected assignments at the end of the detention period. Further exploration of detention class arrangement to support the slow-learners is needed.
- Based on students' feedback, an evaluation on assignment load and assessment frequency
 was carried out among teachers, and opinions from students and parents were collected.
 Adjustments have been made on reducing the number of assessments and better
 coordination will be conducted by ESC to alleviate the pressure experienced by students.

Feedback and Follow-up

- It was suggested that the study skill workshop for F.1 students be extended and better incorporated into the Form Teacher Period curriculum. Hence, the study skill workshop in the F.1 Bridging Course was refined and conducted by our own teachers.
- In view of the many multi-disciplinary approaches of educational issues and trends, the direction of facilitating learning across the curriculum and development of generic skills were generally agreed upon and shall continue to be addressed in the next school development cycle. Cross-curricular learning through project work will be introduced starting from F.1 in 2024-25.
- The rapid development of IT, media and AI has brought huge impacts and challenges to teaching and learning, and prompted both teachers and students to improvise with necessary changes in order to adapt to and be better equipped for future. The competent and ethical use of technologies are crucial generic skills for future success.

Major Achievements

- As a structural approach, the Whole Person Education Framework and Form Teacher Period Curriculum were extended to F.3 and F.6 this year. Some fine-tuning of topics for F.1 and F.2 were also made based on the experiences of the past 2 years. A rich variety of activities and programmes were conducted and all FT Period materials were tailor-made and delivered. It is agreed that the structured framework and curriculum provide guiding direction and implementation strategies to facilitate a whole-school approach for promoting whole person education. The consistently well-above average value of teachers' and parents' perception on "Support of Student Development" and "School Climate" reflected the positive feedback.
- A total of 20 boys and 20 girls participated in the 5-day-4-night Enhanced Smart Teen Project training programme in Feb 2024. The Principal, many teachers and parents attended the graduation ceremony to witness the growth of all participants. Significantly positive feedback was received from students, teachers and parents.
- The sense of gratefulness has been highly promoted and emphasized in school. Initiated by the PTA, the tradition of "Gratitude Lunch for Teachers" was resumed after the suspension during the pandemic years. Students were involved as serving helpers, preparing desserts and coffee (students of Latte Art class of F.5 Multiple Exposure) for teachers. On top of school-home cooperation, students' willingness and values of thankfulness were highly commended.
- Principal, teachers and students of our sister school in Tuan Chau were invited to visit us in Dec 2023. They visited English lessons, joined extra-curricular activities, attended the Open Day and enjoyed lunch gathering with our students and teachers. The school had also signed agreement to establish an additional sister-school partnership with another school in Foshan in Jun 2024. The Principal and teachers also came to our 35th Anniversary Musical performance. All these sister-school programmes have further enhanced the cultural exchange between our students and the mainland students. More two-way interflow programmes are anticipated in the coming years. Together with the increasing number and diversity of activities (talks, visits, interest classes, Chinese Art exhibitions in the Chinese Centre (悅文軒), competitions and study tours) related to Chinese culture and national education, the whole-school average Q-scores of all four subscales related to national identity are above 100 with generally higher scores in senior forms, showing that students are gradually gaining and improving their national identity in secondary school education.
- Efforts have been put into exploring and providing more opportunities to students for community service including flag-selling, activities of Ti-I Yan Oi Elder Academy and Food Angel, and form-based service to HK Schools Sailing Associations during post-exam activities. Students also helped clean and repaint some school facilities on Campus Refreshing Day. The above activities all received positive feedback from both students and teachers. While it is not easy to organize large scale service activities for all students, many students responded that they enjoyed the service experiences and wished to have more diversified service opportunities such as animal rights, conservation and children's welfare.

- Efforts in green education (including the establishment of the Green Club) has been stepped up as a means to provide students with opportunities to serve the community and cultivate a sense of responsibility as global citizens to help protect the Earth. A lot of activities were launched and the promotion of energy-saving and recycling habits were enhanced. Feedback was very positive, and students' participation and awareness were encouraging.
- In response to the societal concerns throughout this academic year, Mental Health Education has been greatly boosted since Nov 2023. Activities under the theme "Small-but-certain Happiness" (小確幸) were launched from 19 to 24 Nov 2023. The number of Friday Functions addressing the issue was doubled to 4 times, including stress relieving workshop, talk on eating disorder related to emotions, mental health workshop and table-top RPG. Students-at-risk were identified, supported and referred accordingly through the 3-tier support scheme launched by the government. In addition, a school-based clinical psychologist was hired to provide additional support to students in need. All efforts were well received with positive feedback and much appreciated by students and parents.
- Riding on the opportunities of the 35th Anniversary of the school, events and activities had been organized to allow students to serve the school in different capacities. Almost all students participated in at least one activity and many of them played key roles as event organizers or helpers. Throughout the events, they have expanded their exposure and interaction with the community and public, including guests, alumni, primary school students and teachers, etc. All Visual Arts major students have participated in the Campus Art Project and helped design and renovate the communal areas of different floors. Students' design concepts and presentations received high commendation from professional interior designers and architects. The Project is still ongoing in the coming years.
- A group of adventurous students (shortlisted from a double population of enrolment through rigorous pre-trip training and service engagement) participated in the 35th Anniversary Overseas Expedition Cycling in Mongolia (a country of OBOR), where they completed an exhilarating 5-day 150-km mountain bike ride; explored the rich biodiversity, traditional nomadic culture and lifestyle of Mongolian; learned the history and economic development of the country; and volunteered to renovate the facilities and create mural paintings in local Child Development Centre and Rehabilitation Hospital. The extraordinary expedition trip helped students to build resilience and positive values towards life; appreciate the cultural diversity of different nations in the world; and contribute their efforts and talents in serving others. Their volunteer work received high commendation from the Mongolian Consulate in Hong Kong, who even sent representatives to welcome them home at the airport and present certificates of appreciation to all students.

Reflection

- While various attempts were made to provide more opportunities for students to serve others, it is still rather difficult to arrange large scale service activities for all students. It was also noted that many limitations and difficulties on the scale of participants were encountered when arranging activities for the elderly through the Ti-I Yan Oi Elder Academy. After evaluation, it was decided that the Elder Academy be terminated after the completion of the activities in 2024. New NGO partners and other modes/forms of service opportunities shall be explored to provide more opportunities of community service for students.
- Not many overseas tour were organized (except one mainland study tour, CS Tours for F.4 & F.5, and Overseas Expedition to Mongolia) in 2023-24 because of the busy schedule of the 35th Anniversary events. With the opening up of more opportunities for overseas exposure and experiences from GBA, other mainland cities, and countries in South East Asia or OBOR, it is anticipated that more overseas tours of various nature (including PE training, VA exposure, national education, etc) will be organized in the coming year to enhance students' national identity and global citizenship. In addition, the Grand Tour will be organized for F.5 in 2024-25 after the transition year of 2023-24. Therefore, it is reminded that a better overall coordination of various overseas tours (in terms of timing and duration, potential target participants, major themes, financial resources, etc) is crucial in 2024-25.
- While we have stepped up mental health education, students' needs have also increased significantly. A lack of social skills, increased academic pressure and parents' expectations have all adversely affected students' mental health. On the one hand, awareness of mental well-being has increased and the school has been more flexible and tolerant to students with emotional problems. On the other hand, there are still a lot of misunderstandings and stigma attached to mental illness among students, parents and teachers. Further efforts on students' whole-person education, parent education and staff development on this issue are expected.

Feedback and Follow-up

- The Whole Person Education Framework and Form Teacher Period curriculum will be
 incorporated as routine. The framework was reviewed and revised to incorporate the 12
 PVAs of EDB's Value Education Framework. The content and schedule of Form Teacher
 Period Curriculum will be constantly reviewed and updated based on the feedback from
 students and teachers to better align with the needs of students.
- Opportunities for community service should be further enhanced to help connect students
 with the community and society as well as build a sense of citizenship for caring about society
 and serving the needy.
- In terms of whole-person education, concerns for careers and life planning education were also raised as it was observed that some students failed to set clear goals and hence, may not be able to foster a positive and proactive life attitude. This may warrant special attention in the upcoming school development cycle.

Major Achievements

- Continued intensive efforts have been put into exploring opportunities and resources from external organizations to enrich our talented students' development in sports/arts. The total number of projects involving external resources that the school is promoting/participating in the areas relevant to sports/arts has always exceeded the limit set in the KPM report of EDB, from 76 last year to 91 this year. This includes the "Rowing Week" in Feb 2024 through LCSD School Sports Programme. All F.1-2 PE major classes attended the training and all junior form classes joined the inter-class indoor rowing relay, with selected students joining inter-school competitions and captured 17 individual prizes and team awards. All other projects were also very welcomed by students and a long list of prizes and awards were captured.
- Every single junior form student and more than 60% of senior form students participated in territory-wide inter-school competitions related to sports/arts. A total of 39 students participated in 51 national or international sports competitions and many of them came back with glorious prizes. Together with the outstanding figures in physical fitness performance (around 80% of all students achieving the standard of "Gold" in the "School Physical Fitness Award Scheme"), students' performance in PE/VA are undoubtedly remarkable.
- With the selfless and unfailing support from PTA and AA, the Student Scholarship Scheme
 was established to recognize and reward students' achievements in academics, arts, sports
 and leadership. The first batch of scholarships for F.6 students of 2023-24 were presented on
 Speech Day 2024 and those for F.1-5 students will be presented on Speech Day of the
 following year.
- The Careers Day for F.4-5 students was successfully held in Nov 2023. Around 30 alumni (almost double that of the target of 16), who came from 19 career fields, participated in the event. Students were engaged and proactive to raise questions. Teachers observed that most students acquired a better understanding about various occupations and many students developed positive attitudes and values about career and work. The program also demonstrated our strong bonding with the alumni.
- A VA Talent Pool was established by an online collection of VA students' data on participation in VA-related competitions and activities. Over 350 competition records and over 500 activity reports were received from students' input. The data helps to spot out the students in specific VA talent areas and facilitate target students to join competitions or VA top-up programmes. In addition, over 100 VA competition awards were presented to our school students.
- In this first normal post-pandemic school year, more parents and alumni were willing and able to come back to school for organizing or joining activities. A long list of activities organized by the PTA had been successful in fostering home-school cooperation and enhancing parent education. Some activities (e.g. CNY gathering, mentorship programme) were also jointly organized by the PTA and AA to unite the entire Ti-I community and act as role-models for students to boost a stronger sense of belonging. Parents' feedback in the stakeholder's survey on home-school cooperation was constantly well above average.

- Riding on the 35th Anniversary of the school, a number of celebration events were organized to allow the school to unit all stakeholders and to connect with external parties so that students were provided with more opportunities to be exposed and to learn to interact with different people. For example, students had the chance to learn from the stories of many elite alumni through interviewing them for writing up the 35th Anniversary Publication; and to enjoy many friendly games and matches with alumni in the Alumni Gala Day. Our VA students were privileged to receive comments and learn from professional designers and architects in the Campus Art Project. When organizing both the Joint School Arts Festival and Adventure Run, our students were also provided with ample opportunities to interact with invited guests (e.g. artists, sports experts, etc.) as well as students, teachers and parents from primary schools and other secondary schools. These two events received particularly excellent feedback from different parties and both attracted attention of the media to report our success. Feedback from guests and attending schools on our students' performances was positive.
- The 35th Anniversary Musical Spirit, was a resounding success, drawing an audience of around 2000 people over two nights in July 2024 at Sir Run Run Shaw Hall, CUHK. The event showcased the incredible, diverse talents of more than 200 students, who dedicated themselves to every aspect of the production from ideation and conceptualization to script writing, acting, and creative projection mapping design. Not only the stage performance but also the process of the entire production were precious and fruitful learning experiences provided to all students involved. All audiences were deeply impressed by the students' talents, passion, and the exceptionally high caliber of the show. The success of the show was also reported by the media.
- With careful planning and lengthy liaison, the project of revamping the VA special rooms was finally confirmed and approved by the IMC with adequate financial resources solicited. The project is expected to be completed by 2024-25 with some new features and facilities installed for students to further develop their talents in specific VA fields.

Reflection

- While selected students/teams (including the athletics team, basketball team and students of DSE PE elective) were more engaged and willing to put in extra effort, the participation rate for joint-team morning run and fitness training was not as satisfactory as expected in general. With their busy academic and routine training schedule, students were not strongly motivated to participate in additional morning run or after-school training. A more structured and organized plan should be executed with the incorporation of some monthly special event (S&C testing) or fitness training on special themes.
- The attempt of establishing the VA Talent Pool was encouraging and welcomed by both students and teachers. However, the operation logistics and analysis mechanism should be reviewed and further modified to facilitate better data verification, statistical analysis and easy identification of students' talents to match with external opportunities of activities and competitions.

Feedback and Follow-up

- New and recent attempts at extending students' exceptional PE/VA talents (e.g. Multiple Exposure lesson, exposure activities in the PE curriculum, talent programmes in the VA curriculum, the annual VA exhibition, etc.) all became parts of routine school work. Every effort will continue to be steered to uphold the strong school vibe in PE/VA and towards a balanced development between academics and PE/VA.
- Learning from the experiences of the 35th Anniversary Adventure Run, it was suggested that
 an annual sports event shall be organized for primary school students. It serves the purposes
 of both providing opportunities for our students to apply their knowledge and interact with
 primary school students; and promoting the strong vibe and emphasis of sports of our
 school.
- It would be even more desirable to ride on students' strong passion and unique talents in PE/VA to support multiple areas of their whole person development. Suggested strategies include strengthening connection and collaboration of PE/VA with other academic departments of different KLAs to foster learning across the curriculum and the cultivation of generic skills; building upon their dedicated engagement in PE/VA to develop their positive values and attitudes and resilience against adversity; applying and utilizing their giftedness in PE/VA to community service to enhance their sense of contribution and responsibilities to society; and relay their intense interests and wide exposure in PE/VA into career development and life planning. These suggestions may likely become some of the focuses and strategies of relevant major concerns in the future school development cycles.

Student Performance

Students' Attitude and Behaviour

Students' general learning attitude has been gradually improving after the pandemic in spite of some struggles in terms of adjustments and adaptations over the years. There were continuous improvements in students' assignment submission and classroom learning performance. In general, the vast majority of students enjoy school life with a positive attitude towards learning. However, our unique student profiles and caliber may result in a relatively wide diversity in students' academic learning capabilities and attitudes. This may hinder the academic self-efficacy of some population of students and result in some negative feelings or emotions that needs guidance support and intensive coaching. Most students understand the importance of academic learning, but some may struggle to strike a balance between academic pursuit and PE/VA talent development as they are likely to have a packed schedule for PE/VA activities/competitions. While teachers are constantly going the extra miles to help students in habit formation, study skills and time management, parents' support and collaboration are always the key to success in shaping students' attitudes and rectifying students' insufficiencies. With the energetic and creative nature of our talented PE/VA students, they are mostly outgoing, sociable, presentable and devoted to their areas of interest. They are willing to try and engage in most of the exposure opportunities offered by the school or outside organizations. Given ample and multiple platforms, we believe that our students always shine in various aspects.

Students are mostly well-behaved as evident from the school-based Discipline Performance Index (DPI). While most students' discipline is well above average and a large proportion of students with completely clean discipline record, the most common minor discipline issues includes improper uniform, unauthorized mobile phone usage and missing student ID card in school examinations. Only a handful rare incidents of severe disciplinary cases (with a total of 2 major demerits of the whole school) were reported. A majority of students described themselves as honest and attached importance to morality. Many students described their positive relationship with peers and friends but also reported occasional difficulties in communication and interpersonal relationship resulting from inadequate social skills and manners. In general, there is room for further improvement in students' conduct and behavior, and this is particularly true when extending to their online activities and the use of social media.
