



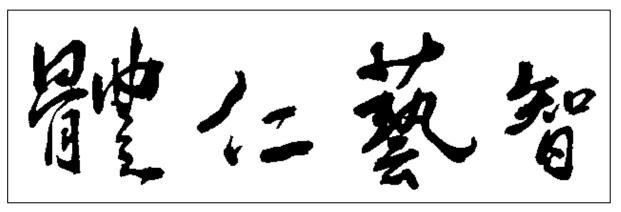

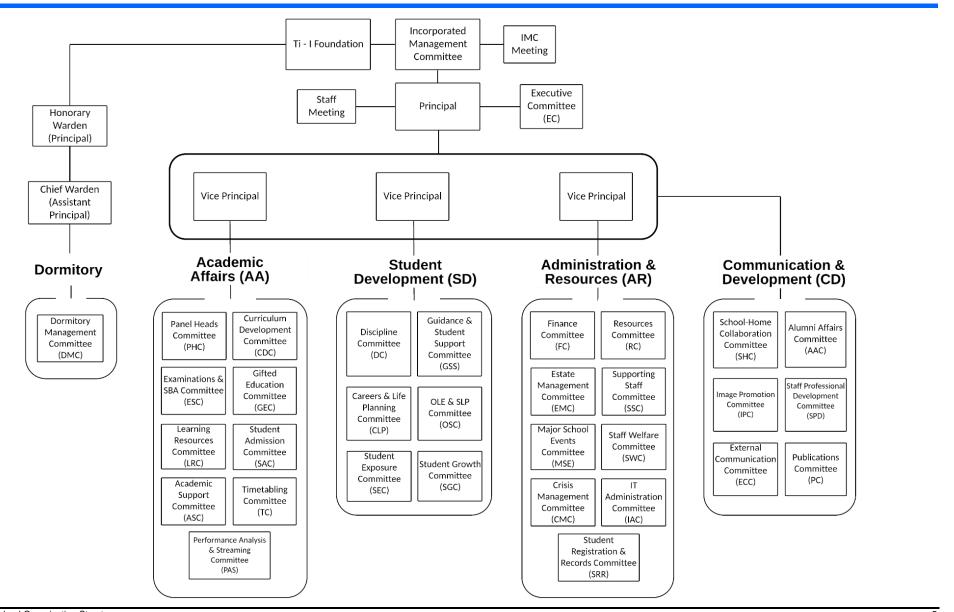

Two 1Gbps fibre Internet connections have been established to connect the whole school wired and wireless network to the Internet separately. A whole school wireless network with 100 Access Points is operating in subscription service mode. Network security services, including email filtering, firewall control and network monitoring, are hired to protect the school network from hackers' attacks.

3. I.T. Related Consumables:
